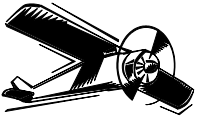

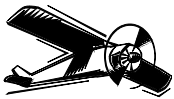

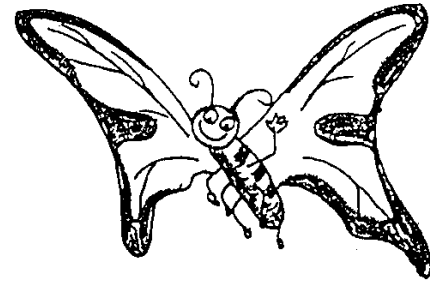


THE INSTRUCTOR'S CORNER

This Month - PREFLIGHTS

The preflight inspection of my aircraft is a very important step toward the eventual happy landing that I'm expecting. The preflight, hopefully, will show my aircraft to be in proper condition for a safe flight. But if I do find some irregularity, now is the time to find it - on the ground, where I can do something about it. This is about the only time I find any pleasure looking for trouble!



There is a human frailty that I must overcome - habit. I mean the dictionary definition which states: 'An acquired behavior pattern regularly followed until it has become almost involuntary.' Habit causes me to do things the same way I did them the last time and the time before. The repetition looks at the same items each time in the same old way. But what about the other side of that same item, underneath, or from above? Is there a SINGLE square inch I haven't inspected lately? If variety is the spice of life, then I want it here! I'll poke around at different angles for different viewpoints. I usually start the inspection at the nose, then left wing, and so forth, back to the nose. This time for spice, I'll start at the tail and eventually wind up, of course, at the tail again.

Let's look deeper. Is this nut really secure?* How about that bolt; is my painted line-up mark (witness) still lined up? Try twisting the fuel line. Is the clamp really holding the tubing tight onto the fitting? Having the attitude that there's something wrong and I just haven't found it yet, helps me to spot things that may not have been "right" since the day it was built!

Although I follow manufacturers maintenance schedules at the recommended intervals (airframe, engine, etc.), I will ask a favor of a fellow pilot. "Would you mind doing a preflight on my aircraft for me? And if you would like, I'll return the favor by doing a preflight of yours." This favor serves an excellent purpose by allowing a different set of eyes, hands and thought patterns to hopefully spot something that mine have overlooked.

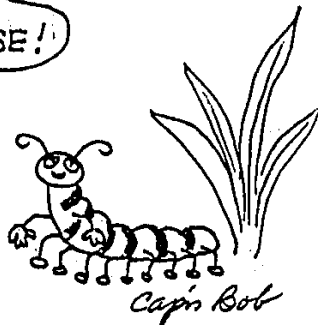
If I'm going to fly someone else's aircraft, I won't know its condition. It's up to me to do a thorough preflight - it's my responsibility, I am the pilot! I also refrain from interruptions during the preflight, 'cause in flying I don't want to miss a thing!

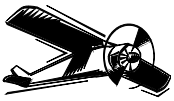

Here it is, Cold and Flu season. As I sit here at home trying to nurse myself back to health, it brings to mind some of the problems that we face today with "over the counter medicine".

Prior to flying you should be in good health. A stuffy nose can be a problem and taking something for it can be worse. If you are coughing a lot and figure on taking cough medicine, make sure that you read the label because most of them state that it may cause drowsiness. We normally don't fly high enough to have problems with low pressure from altitude, but if you go to Denver to fly, you could.

Just remember to look at the medication you are taking and determine if you are in good shape to fly. If you have any doubts, then wait for another day. It may be the best wait that you can have, that way you will have a second chance.
